### Seminar Highlights

This lecture is the first of three that will:

1. investigate will the complex interplay between pancreatitis, inflammatory bowel disease and cholangitis in the cat.
2. the role of infectious agents in causing diarrhoea in kittens.
3. complicated disease that is diabetes mellitus in cats.

This first lecture will highlight the complex interplay between pancreatitis, inflammatory bowel disease and cholangitis in the cat. We will investigate why feline anatomy and physiology predisposed to concurrent pancreatitis, inflammatory bowel disease and cholangitis. We will consider why so many cases of diarrhoea and/or vomiting in the cat result from the complex interactions of Triaditis. We will reflect on why some cases of chronic lymphocytic inflammatory bowel disease evolve into lymphocytic or even lymphoblastic intestinal lymphoma. We will then review a case of acute pancreatitis – considering likely causes, and perhaps unlikely presentation, including pulmonary oedema and pleural fluid.

### KEYNOTE SPEAKER:

## Dr. Danièle Gunn-Moore, Professor of Feline Medicine, University of Edinburgh



Danièle Gunn-Moore graduated with Distinction from the R(D)SVS, University of Edinburgh, in 1991.

After a year in small animal practice she joined The Feline Centre, University of Bristol, initially as the Feline Advisory Bureau Scholar, then the Duphar Feline Fellow, and completed a PhD study into Feline Infectious Peritonitis in 1997. After a short period as Lecturer in Veterinary Pathology, University of Bristol, she returned to Edinburgh to establish the Feline Clinic and is Professor of Feline Medicine. She is interested in all aspects of feline medicine; she is an internationally recognised expert in her area, has lectured extensively and published over a 100 peer-reviewed research papers plus many reviews and book chapters. In 2009 she was awarded the BSAVA Woodrow Award for outstanding contribution in the field of small animal veterinary medicine, in 2011 she was awarded the International Society for Feline Medicine/Hill's award for Outstanding Contributions to Feline Medicine, and in 2012 the Royal Dick students voted her “The clinician I would most like to be”. She shares her home with her husband Frank and a 16 year old Maine Coon boy called Mortlach (named after a Scottish single malt whisky).
