

Frank Dhont (PhD Yale University, MHum Gadjah Mada University, MA Lund University)

Frank Dhont is Senior Lecturer in the Institute of Asian Studies. He is historian of Indonesia and Southeast Asia. As Indonesianist he is regularly involved in multidisciplinary initiatives and is founder and chair of the International Indonesia Forum.

His major research interests include the reactions of both indigenous rulers and ordinary people to Japanese colonialism in the Netherlands Indies during World War II. He is also interested in the history of both World Wars in Asia and the spread of nationalism, especially in the context of colonial empires in Asia. He is currently working on the manuscript of *Outlasting Colonialism: Socio-political Change in the Javanese Principalities under the Japanese Occupation of Indonesia during World War II*.
