Forum – Women in leadership: opportunities and challenges in leadership careers Higher Education sector

According to the Hong Kong Government Census and Statistics Department, women have made greater gains in higher education and are now earning more bachelor's degrees than men in Hong Kong. In the 2022, over 52 per cent of UGC funded bachelor's degrees were conferred to women. While acknowledging gains made in numbers of women, it is equally important to address the challenges women continue to confront in academia with only one in five senior academic positions held by women; women also hold the least senior administrative positions and are the lowest paid among higher education administrators as gender biases and stereotypes frequently occur, consciously or unconsciously.

To address the challenges of the gender gap in the Higher Education sector in Hong Kong, British Council is planning to organise a Forum entitled **Women in leadership: opportunities and challenges in leadership careers Higher Education sector** on March 6 2024. Our guest speakers will discuss the current status of women academics in leadership, the opportunities and challenges they face in advancing into leadership positions, and how to empower them to overcome the obstacles to professional advancement and to bring greater influence in their professional arena. The Forum will also celebrate the launch of the British Council's first-ever Postgraduate Scholarship for Women, which will provide opportunities for beneficiaries to continue with their studies and research in specific subjects.

The Forum

Through a series of of keynote speeches and panel discussions the Forum will support delegates to explore the following questions:

- What are the opportunities and challenges for women in advancing into leadership positions in Higher Education in Hong Kong?
- How to empower women to overcome the obstacles to professional advancement?
- How to drive changes in gender equality in the Higher Education sector?
- How can Higher Education Institutions support women to advance their careers?
- What more can be done to support women to enter and stay in the Higher Education sector?
