TLA1: Lecture

The course leader will present and explain the substantive law on the topics listed below in the course syllabus.

TLA2: Interactive class discussions

Students will learn how to apply family law to hypothetical situations similar to those they may face in their future social work practice. Students will also be engaged in debates to develop a critical view on the strengths and deficiencies of the various areas of family law, especially in relation to their future social work practice and clients' needs.

TLA3: Research

Students will use relevant materials and authorities to write one paper.

5. Grading of Student Achievement: Standard (A+, A, A-...F). Grading is based on student performance in assessment tasks / activities.

To pass this course, students must obtain an aggregate mark of 40% and a minimum of 40% in each of the coursework and the examination elements of the assessment. Coursework for this purpose means those ways in which students are assessed otherwise than by the end of session examination.

Assessment will be formative to enable students to demonstrate their capacity to understand, analyse and apply rules and principles and summative to assess understanding and knowledge.

A 3-hour written examination will be held during the University examination period. The examination is designed to assess students' knowledge and understanding of the course and key learning outcomes. Students are expected to read the prescribed readings, be familiar with the relevant legislation and revise those materials covered in lectures and tutorials. Information on the examination is provided throughout the course, and in particular during the final week of the semester.

Details of the written assignment will be provided to students by week 4 of the semester at the latest. The length of the written assignment will be stated on the written instructions but will not exceed 2,000 words in any event.

Students' participation during the interactive tutorial sessions allows them to demonstrate their capacity to understand the subject matter. Student responses in these sessions enable both the students and their tutors to assess the adequacy of their learning and how to improve it where necessary. Students receive formative feedback on their coursework and class performance.

Students are encouraged to take an active approach to their learning in both self-study and the classroom. Sharing experiences, views and feelings are welcomed and may play an important part in learning and development. As in other classes students are encouraged to form study groups and work together in their preparation though individual essays must ultimately be students' own work. Co-operative peer learning enhances academic achievements through working together, clarification of concepts, discussion of ideas, generation of approaches and problem-solving.
