# **Course Aims**

This course aims to:

- 1. introduce to students the core components of social work as a profession, its professional value, ethics and principles, its main theoretical orientation of looking at people's needs and problems in a person-in-environment or ecological perspective.
- 2. equip students with theories and models in assessing and intervening problems of individual and families from social work perspectives, and integrating social work theories, skills, values and ethics in practice in the local context.

# TLA1: Lectures

Lectures cover the major topics of the course with explanation, clarification and discussion during the sessions.

#### TLA2: Tutorials

Tutorials are designed to facilitate students to discuss in smaller groups and in a personal participatory way about social work values, ethics, theories and models.

#### TLA3: Role play and live demonstration

Role play and live demonstration will be conducted in class for students to learn from the lecturer's live demonstration and practise their skills and assessment in social work intervention models. Debriefing and discussion will be made to bring forth the theoretical concepts.

# TLA4: Student presentation

Student presentation is organized to consolidate students' learning and application of social work values, ethics, principles with different theories, models, and skills in practice with individual clients and families.

#### AT1: Examination

Students will be required to answer one long question on a case analysis and assessment and 3-4 short questions on the social work values, ethics and principles. This will be a 3-hour closed book examination.

#### AT2: Tutorial/Student Presentation

Students will be assigned to one kind of individual problem relating with family and make a presentation in groups. Students are expected to apply social work values, ethics and principles, make clear and accurate case analysis with relevant theoretical frameworks, formulate precise treatment goals and demonstrate appropriate skills in assessment and intervention. Students' peer feedback and division of work are included as part of the assessment components.

#### AT3: Term paper

Students will be required to write a term paper with about 3,500 words. Students can search and target for a specific case reported in newspaper in the current year. Basing on evidence-based literature review, applying social work values, ethics and principles, and adopting appropriate social work theories and models, students are expected to have indepth case analysis, formulate an appropriate treatment plan and develop effective intervention methods.

# 1. Keyword Syllabus

# 1.1 Social work values, ethics and principles

Definition of social work, nature, uniqueness and importance of social work values, social work core values, social work instrumental value principles, functions and purposes of the code of ethics, ethical issues, ethical responsibilities, ethical dilemmas and ethical guidelines in social work practice

#### 1.2 Working with individuals

Social work process: intake and engagement, data collection and assessment (ecological perspective), planning and contracting, intervention and monitoring, evaluation and termination.

Person-centred therapy: self, process of therapy, congruence, unconditional positive regard, empathy, therapeutic techniques.

Cognitive—behavioral therapy: relation among emotion, cognition and behaviour, cognitive distortions, cognitive intervention strategies, creating new perspectives, behavioural intervention

# 1.3 Working with families

Structural family therapy: boundary and subsystems, coalition and alliance, family life cycle, intervention techniques

Systemic family therapy: differentiation of self, triangulation, emotional cutoff, nuclear emotional processes, family projection process, multi-generational transmission, socio-emotional process, intervention skills

Satir family therapy: inappropriate roles, dysfunctional rules, unrealistic expectations, communication stances, iceberg metaphor, self-esteem maintenance kit, mandala, temperature reading, parts party.
