TLA2: Project	<p>This course has no formal syllabus. Each student will be required to undertake an individual project which uses the subject matter and skills developed in the programme. Students will finalise their choice of topic by a date to be given. Students will be encouraged to propose their own topic, in consultation with their supervisor. Students will be advised to take up a problem from their work environment. Topics may also be provided, supporting staff interests or related to the needs of a 'client' associated with a member of staff. Each student will be required to submit a project proposal for approval by the project supervisor.</p> <p>The topic area of the project will be chosen so that the aims of the project can be achieved. Criteria for choice include: compatibility with the contents of the programme, compatibility with the interests of a supervisor, availability of necessary specialised resources, local interest and significance.</p>	✓	✓	✓	✓
