Part II Course Details

1. Abstract

- 1. To encourage students to discover the functions of law in society, and its relationship between morality and justice;
- 2. To guide students to developing a sound understanding and appreciation of the concept of the rule of law and its relevance in the context of Hong Kong;
- 3. To familiarise students with the sources, classification and operation of Hong Kong law and other features of the legal system in Hong Kong;
- 4. To introduce students to the legal and constitutional framework in which law is practised and administered in Hong Kong;
- 5. To introduce students to basic features of civil and criminal justice as well as how institutions and procedures were developed to further civil and criminal justice, how the notion of access of justice remains key to evaluating the effectiveness of the civil and criminal justice system and thus how legal aid and alternative dispute resolution (ADR) play a crucial role; and
- 6. To encourage students to think critically about Hong Kong law and institutions and to communicate their views and their analysis effectively both orally and in writing.

Your group is encouraged to book a 30 minute session with the lecturer to discuss any questions you may have in the course of writing your essays.
