Abstract

This course aims to help students -

- examine the nature, scope and significance of land law
- develop a sound knowledge of the principles of land law
- develop the following skills in relation to issues concerning land law:
 - research skills
 - analytical and problem-solving skills
 - effective written and oral communication skills
- develop an awareness of the social and commercial contexts in which land law operates

Additional Information for ATs

Examination: This will test the students' ability to apply principles of land law to solve practical problems. The examination will test the ability of students to present their answers lucidly separating the relevant from the irrelevant issues.

The use of Generative AI tools is not allowed.

Grading of Student Achievement: Standard (A+, A, A-...F). Grading is based on student performance in assessment tasks / activities.

Assessment will be by coursework (40%), which will comprise continuous performance evaluation, a problem based assignment and a final examination (60%).

Applicable to students admitted from Semester A 2022/23 to Summer Term 2024

Students must obtain a minimum mark of 50% in the final examination and an overall mark of 50% in order to pass the course.

Applicable to students admitted before Semester A 2022/23 and in Semester A 2024/25 and thereafter

Students must obtain a minimum mark of 40% in the final examination and an overall mark of 40% in order to pass the course.

The duration of the examination will be at the discretion of the course leader. The course leader will announce the duration of the examination in the first week of the course. Similarly, the course leader will announce whether the examination will be closed book or open book.

To enable the full benefit to be obtained from this course, students should attend all of the classes and activities.

Assessment will be formative to enable students to demonstrate their capacity to understand, analyse and apply rules and principles and summative to assess ability to synthesise primary and secondary material to solve novel problems.

Assessment Task

Tutorial Group Presentation/s and Class Participation (for students admitted before Semester A 2022/23 and in Semester A 2024/25 & thereafter)

Criterion

Students will be assessed based on their verbal contributions to discussions in lectures and tutorials, in addition to preparation and performance on individual and small group exercises in tutorials. The quality and practical relevance of participation are more important than the quantity. This is also can be demonstrative through specific activities such as the mandatory group presentation of a case study. Note that students will not receive full participation marks merely by attending all classes.

Excellent

(A+, A, A-) Student demonstrates a strong interest in and critical engagement with all course material, significant understanding of the common law and statutory regime in the subject matter, clearly and persuasively communicated written or oral responses, and an obvious and frequent ability to listen to, empathise and engage with fellow students' responses. The student also demonstrates excellent ability to grasp complex concepts and apply these concepts to factual scenarios in an articulate and high calibre manner. The student is also able to possess an excellent ability to correctly identify and apply relevant legal principles and policy to very high standard of accuracy. Not only does the student possess an excellent knowledge of current research and scholarship in the relevant subject area, but the student also is able to provide critique and improvement to the law.

Good

(B+, B, B-) Student demonstrates some critical engagement with course material, a more limited understanding of the common law and the statutory regime in the subject matter, somewhat clear and persuasive communication by written or oral responses, and some ability to listen to and engage with fellow students' responses. However, there is consistent ability to analyse complex factual situations and apply established principles in a logical manner. The student made some minor mistakes in knowledge, however, this does not deter the student's overall understanding of the subject matter.

Fair

(C+, C, C-) Student demonstrates limited critical engagement with course material, little understanding of the common law and the statutory regime in the subject matter, unclear written or oral responses that do not entirely persuade, and only an occasional ability to listen to and engage with fellow students' responses. There is some ability to analyse complex factual situations, apply established principles in a logical manner. Ability to critically evaluate the law using a range of sources. Some ability to propose a solution or make a judgement on the merits of any assertions made. However, there are some inconsistencies and mistakes.

Marginal

(D) Despite otherwise participating in the teaching and learning activities, the student demonstrates minimal to no critical engagement with course material, no understanding of the common law and statutory regime in the subject matter, provides written or oral responses devoid of persuasive devices and correct grammatical structure, and little interest in engaging with fellow students' responses.

There is only basic recall of key legal principles and unable to consistently order and analyse relevant legal principles.

Failure

(F) Almost no participation in teaching and learning activities. The student cannot demonstrate that he or she has read or understands the course material, or that he or she understands the common law and statutory regime in the subject matter. The student does not contribute written or oral responses when prompted, and demonstrates no interest in the views of fellow students on the course material.

There is inadequate knowledge of relevant legal principles and/or fundamental errors.

Assessment Task

Midterm Examination (for students admitted before Semester A 2022/23 and in Semester A 2024/25 & thereafter)

Criterion

Students will be assessed on their application of their understanding of legal principles to fact pattern questions and/or questions testing students' understanding of the legal concepts. Students will need to critically evaluate academic and legal literature in order to articulate them in a structured form, also known as an essay question.

Excellent

(A+, A, A-) Student demonstrates a strong interest in and critical engagement with all course material, significant understanding of the common law and statutory regime in the subject matter, clearly and persuasively communicated written or oral responses, and an obvious and frequent ability to listen to, empathise and engage with fellow students' responses. The student also demonstrates excellent ability to grasp complex concepts and apply these concepts to factual scenarios in an articulate and high calibre manner. The student is also able to possess an excellent ability to correctly identify and apply relevant legal principles and policy to very high standard of accuracy. Not only does the student possess an excellent knowledge of current research and scholarship in the relevant subject area, but the student also is able to provide critique and improvement to the law.

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Assessment Task

End of Semester Examination (for students admitted before Semester A 2022/23 and in Semester A 2024/25 & thereafter)

Criterion

Students will need to demonstrate an adequate command of legal doctrines and case law and be able to critically evaluate the current legal framework. Students will demonstrate this by answering essay questions and fact pattern questions. Students will be assessed on their writing style and ability to demonstrate their knowledge that they have learned through

their readings and lectures. Further, students will be evaluated on their ability to weave the case precedents and arguments in their responses.
