Students should note that this course is a required course in the JSD programme, and the maximum period of study for JSD is six years. Any periods of leave of absence and academic suspension are counted towards the maximum period of study.

Prerequisites: (Course Code and Title)	Before enrolling on this course, Doctor of Juridical Science (JSD) students are required to: 1. satisfy the requirements of the taught component; and 2. obtain a CGPA of at least 2.0 for cohorts 2013 and before and a CGPA of at least 2.7 for cohorts 2014 and thereafter; and 3. obtain Programme Director's approval of the thesis topic and outline. For cohorts of 2008 and thereafter: If a student fails or has taken only one <u>core</u> course, i.e., the student has passed only one core course and six electives, and has obtained approval of his/her thesis topic and outline, he/she may be permitted to take the "Doctoral Thesis" course on condition that he/she passes the non-completed course within the next academic year. No substitute course is permitted.

If a student fails only one elective, i.e., the student has passed two core courses and five electives, and has obtained approval of his/her thesis topic and outline, he/she may be permitted to take the “Doctoral Thesis” course on condition that:

1. he/she passes the failed course within the next academic year; or
 2. satisfies substitute requirement(s) as stipulated by the Dean of School of Law.

The thesis will help the students to develop innovative thinking in tackling legal issues to meet the needs of the local as well as international communities

The presentation should clarify the research and finding of the dissertation as a discovery-enriched project, and is to be made six months before the submission of thesis (supervisors have the discretion to decide whether to shorten the six-month requirement); (ii) attend at least one presentation made by another student at any other JSD Colloquium; (iii) submit a doctoral thesis, which should then be confirmed by the Panel of Examiners that the thesis is of the required academic standard; (iv) pass the oral examination of the thesis. The thesis must display a high level of originality, intellectual accomplishment and must: (1) make a substantial intellectual contribution to legal scholarship; and (2) be of publishable quality. 3. Thesis Topic and Outline

Students who wish to start their registration for LW8001 should submit their thesis topics by the end of Week 6 of the preceding semester. Thereafter, a supervisor will be appointed by the School of Law to each student. Each student should then prepare a thesis outline under the guidance of his/her supervisor. Upon satisfaction of the supervisor of the thesis outline, the student will submit his/her outline to the Qualifying Panel to be established by the School

of Law for approval. After the outline is approved by the Qualifying Panel, the student should write his/her thesis in accordance with the outline.

4. Supervisors and Qualifying Panels

The School of Law will establish a Qualifying Panel for each student. The composition of the Panel is:

- Chairman: Supervisor
- Members:
 - (a) Co-supervisor (if any); and/or
 - (b) member(s) appointed by Dean (SLW) from among SLW staff who are of Assistant Professor level or above.

The composition of the Panel is subject to approval by the School Graduate Studies Committee.

The Panel should normally

- prescribe courses for students, as appropriate;
- approve proposals for Independent Work;
- monitor student performance, providing a report on each student's progress to SGS at least once per year;
- make recommendations to SGS on students' ability to continue studies and to undertake Independent Work; and
- recommend termination of candidature if the student's academic performance is unsatisfactory.

After the start of the Doctoral Thesis, a JSD student must provide a report on his/her progress to his/her Qualifying Panel at least once per year. He/she must also submit a written report on his/her study progress to his/her supervisor at the end of every Semester A and Semester B.

The Panel must be satisfied that the work is being conducted independently by the student and has been undertaken substantially during the student's candidature.

In addition, the School of Law will assess each JSD student's progress in his/her thesis writing on a yearly basis. Students' semester progress reports and annual progress reports will carry significant weight during this annual assessment process. A student's study may be terminated if his/her progress is determined to be unsatisfactory or if he/she fails to submit progress reports.

5. Co-supervision

After successful completion of the taught component, a student can apply to go back to his/her own country to write the thesis. The supervision work of the student may be done jointly by the chief supervisor and the co-supervisor. The chief supervisor must be a full-time staff member of City University of Hong Kong School of Law. The co-supervisor must be qualified to be a supervisor of PhD students in his/her own institution. The student must report regularly to his/her supervisors on at least on a semester basis.

6. Medium of Thesis Presentation

The medium of instruction and assessment is English.

7. Oral Examination of Thesis

The thesis is assessed on the basis of written work and an oral examination, by a Panel of Examiners.

The Panel of Examiners will be appointed by the SGS and constituted according to University regulations.
