

Prof. Kwok Yu LAU

The areas of his teaching and research are housing policy, housing management, social policy and administration. He is also an Honorary Fellow of the Hong Kong Institute of Housing and a Registered Social Worker.

Prof. Lau has extensive experience in public service. He served as a full member of the Hong Kong Housing Authority and as member of its various committees, and was a member of the Housing Affairs Committees related to public and private housing of the Kwai Tsing District Board and Sham Shui Po District Council respectively. He was formerly a member of the Housing Bureau's Long Term Housing Strategy Review Steering Group and the Urban Renewal Authority's Land, Rehousing and Compensation Committee and its Review Committee. Prof. Lau also served as a member of the Supervisory Board of the Hong Kong Housing Society. He has also been an advisor to a number of housing residents' organisations.

Prof. Lau is currently a member of the Hong Kong Housing Society's Special Committee for Elderly Housing, a member of the Urban Renewal Authority's Sham Shui Po District Advisory Committee, a co-opted member of the Hong Kong Institute of Housing's Professional Practice Committee. He is also a member of the Hospital Governing Committee of Our Lady of Maryknoll Hospital of the Hospital Authority and a member of the Diocesan Building & Development Commission and its Research & Development Committee.
