She started her career managing the first high-volume high-quality neuter clinic in Malaysia before working at the international level. Her experiences with companion animal welfare include managing several large-scale dog population control projects in Asia, as well as advocating animal welfare to governments and organisations on humane approaches using science-based, comprehensive, and participatory methods. Dr Lee also has experience leading a campaign to include animal welfare science into veterinary curricula across Asia. She provided training to more than half of the 250 veterinary schools in Asia, started a network of animal welfare educators, and conducted online courses for vets. She is currently an independent animal welfare consultant and is on the World Small Animal Veterinary Association's Wellness and Welfare Committee.
