About the Speaker

Professor Zhao Hong was a former Member (2016-2020) and Chairperson of the Appellate Body of the World Trade Organization (WTO). Currently a Professor of International Law at Peking University Law School and Guest Professor at Fudan University, she held various senior positions at the PRC Ministry of Commerce (MOFCOM), including the Commissioner of the Department of WTO Affairs, Assistant Representative of the Office of Trade Negotiations, and Deputy Director-General of the Bureau of Anti-Monopoly. She chaired the WTO's TRIMS Committee when working at China's Permanent Mission to the WTO. After retiring from MOFCOM, she served as a Deputy President of the China Academy of International Trade and Economic Cooperation. She was educated in Peking University Law School with LLB, LLM and PhD degrees. Professor Zhao is married with a son.
