Part II Course Details

Abstract

The first practicum provides students a goal-directed learning experience, part of which is incidental learning, in helping them to experience and understand what real-life practice is like and how a service delivery system operates in the organizational environment of a social work agency. In addition, students will, by way of taking on the staff and professional roles, acquire the professional identity of a social worker. This course aims to enable students to:

1.1 apply and integrate social work theories and methods in the practicum service setting;

1.2 develop professional skills to implement social work theories and methods in practice;

- 1.3 familiarize with the professional role and staff role in host agencies; and
- 1.4 develop reflective attitude and skills in practice as they internalize social work values and ethics.

Criterion

Ability in applying and integrating social work theories and methods in the practicum service setting

Excellent (A+, A, A-)

Strong evidence of critical thinking in integrating knowledge in practice; good organization, capacity to analyse and synthesize data; superior grasp of subject matter; evidence of extensive knowledge base, professional skills and attitude in performing both professional and staff roles; strong evidence of reflexivity in practice; strong commitment in professional values, ethics, and identity.

Good (B+, B, B-)

Evidence of grasp of subject matter in applying knowledge in practice; evidence of critical capacity and analytic ability; reasonable understanding of subject matter; evidence of familiarity with knowledge base, professional skills and attitude in performing both professional and staff roles; good evidence of reflexivity in practice; commitment in professional values, ethics, and identity.

Fair (C+, C, C-)

Evidence in applying related knowledge in practice; some evidence of critical capacity and analytic ability; adequate understanding of subject matter; evidence of familiarity with essential theory base, core professional skills and attitude in performing both professional and staff roles; some evidence of reflexivity in practice; commitment in professional values, ethics, and identity.

Marginal (D)

Barely sufficient familiarity with basic knowledge, skills and attitude in practice to enable the student to progress. As fieldwork is the testing ground for practice, the Practice Board will review all the D cases to decide whether the students should retake the course.

Failure (F)

Little evidence of familiarity with theories in practice; weakness in critical and analytic capacity and professional skills; limited or irrelevant use of knowledge and professional skills and attitude in performing both professional and staff roles; little evidence of reflexively in practice; weak commitment in professional values, ethics, and identity.

Keyword Syllabus

Relating social work knowledge to practice in identifying and describing social problems and their impacts on individuals, families and the community; understanding individual clients from a human development and ecological perspective; identifying and describing the community contexts of practice, i.e. the host community; gaining direct knowledge of formal and informal community resources; understanding how social policies affect clients, families, and the community; and how to analyze social policies;

Demonstrating professional skills in verbal communication, relational and helping skills; written communication and documentation skills; utilizing community resources; developing sound assessment, and critically selecting and implementing interventions at all levels of generalist practice; influencing, guiding and managing the planned change process; developing skills in evaluating social work practice;

Analyzing the mission, goals, and services of the agency; understanding how agency policies affect clients, families, and the community; Performing both staff role, and professional social work roles and identity in the host organization as service provider, an agency employee, and a professional practitioner-trainee; reflecting on the values issues and ethical dilemmas in performing these roles;

Demonstrating attitude and skills required of a reflective practitioner with a professional identity through internalizing social work values and ethics reflexively; Integrating and deepening the commitments to generic social work principles, core beliefs and values in professional practice; appreciating social work values and ethics as central premise of practice through self reflection and use of fieldwork supervision;
